Introductions and Session Plan

Part 1: Case Studies: Highlighting Success, Challenges, and Opportunities

1. Jay Tanner, Utah

Jay Tanner is a private landowner in northern Utah. He will speak to his experience with sage-grouse conservation efforts on private lands, the challenges and opportunities associated with conservation easements, and integrating private lands management with public lands management.

2. Lee Hemner, Foster Creek Conservation District, Washington State

Lee Hemner has been working since 1999 with the Foster Creek Conservation District on a complex, multi-stakeholder plan to help multiple local species, including greater sage-grouse. Their work includes a Habitat Conservation Plan, significant private/public interface challenges, and a need for adaptable approaches.

3. Miles Anderson, Saskatchewan

Miles Anderson is a rancher in Saskatchewan, on the U.S–Canada border. He will share his experiences of operating near a protected area, and working on sage-grouse conservation at an international border.

Part 2: Small-group Discussion and Problem Solving:

We will develop several key questions for small group discussion. Each group in the room will have the opportunity to discuss one of these topics.

- Strategic easement planning: overcoming challenges in landscape-level planning
- Split estate in areas with mineral or energy development
- Protecting landowners who do the right thing proactively
- Identification of coordination/information needs for achieving sage-grouse conservation goals

4. Rick Danvir, Western Landowner Alliance (Wyoming)

Rick Danvir has been involved in the management of Utah and Wyoming sagebrush lands for wildlife and livestock for many years. He currently works for the Western Landowner Alliance. Rick will speak to some of unintended consequences of private lands conservation efforts.

5. Amos Eno, Resources First Foundation (Maine)

Amos Eno is the President of Resources First Foundation. RFF provides a vast array of resources for private landowners on conservation topics, ranging from sage-grouse specific resources to information on estate and tax planning, as well as linkages to other conservation networks. Amos will introduce us to the resources available through RFF and other partner organizations. The RFF platform provides an opportunity to scale land owner engagement in conservation stewardship at the working group, county and state levels.
